"Loving Mr. Lincoln: An introduction to President Lincoln's Life"

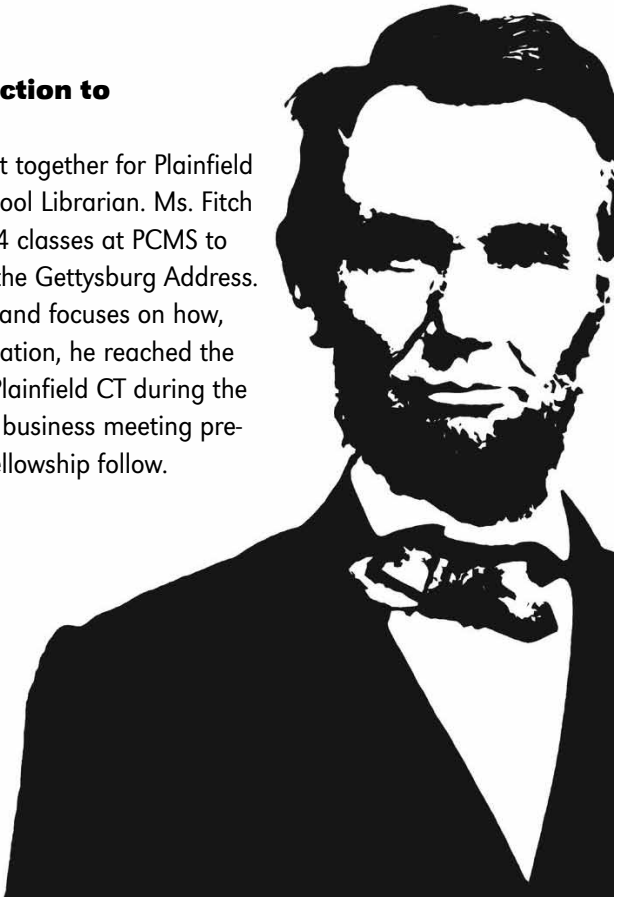

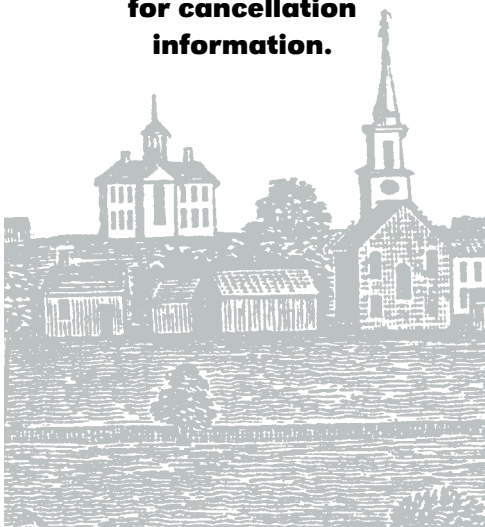
Wednesday, May 28 • 6:00 pm 44th Annual Meeting and Potluck Supper.

FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Fall and winter have not been boring. We frequently received communications and questions. Many required a search for an answer (with "Plainfield Transformed," our town history often consulted.) For example: Do you know the location of Grafton Wilson's house? What year was the brick All Hallows Church built? How did the Carpet Grounds on Ward Avenue get its name?

We are no longer using the display case at the Killingly Historical Museum. Thank you, Killingly, for sharing. The History Room at the recreation-seniors complex is our main site for display.

The History Room has had a surprising flow of visitors with interesting information and donations brought to us: several photos including an autographed 8x10" of Walt Drope, items from the Tavernier estate including a book of remembrances of Plainfield written in 1983 by Raymond Mercier, and the Plainfield Rotary brought us material on PIMA from its beginnings, including photos of past Miss Plainfields and programs. We also were visited by the new owners of Milner Hall (the former VFW) in Moosup.

During Walktober, we held an Open House at the Plainfield History Room. Our collection of "Hermiads," the Plainfield High School yearbooks, was available for browsing. We recently discovered that the 1917 issue, which we did not have, was never printed.

In November your President spoke at the Thanksgiving Dinner for Rotary's international exchange students. The topic: Thanksgiving and related practices in this region's history. The local DAR invited historical society members to its November meeting with its program on the Thompson Tourtelottes and the Civil War.

The weather cooperated in January for Show & Tell. Al Orlomowski from Canterbury brought his collection of pelts of native animals.

Colonial Health and Rehabilitation (formerly Village Manor) requested assistance in locating old photos of Plainfield to copy and display on the walls of the facility.

The new society committee on fundraising met and is planning to publish and sell a book of old local postcard scenes. Committee members are: Rachel Holmes, Marilyn Labbe, Tom and Melody Guillemette, Marge Hoskin and Ruth Bergeron.

By the way, the Wilson house is on Green Hollow Road, the church was built in 1901-2, and the carpet grounds was the site of a cotton carpet mill in 1832. Isn't history fascinating? Thank you to all our members who are making our society and our history known to others.

2013 ANNUAL PRESERVATION AWARDS

The Society's Annual Historic Preservation Award will be presented at the March 26 meeting to the Town of Plainfield for its creation of space for use by the Municipal Historian/Plainfield Historical Society. The space is now known as the Plainfield History Room.

A certificate of appreciation will be given to the Aldrich Free Public Library for storing many of the society's items for years and supporting the historical society's efforts.

MOOSUP LIBRARY COMPLETES DIGITIZATION PROJECT

The Aldrich Free Public Library in Moosup has digitized "The Plainfield Souvenir" printed in 1895 so that it can be accessed online by going to the library's website Aldrichlibrary.org.

The book has photos of Plainfield, both its industries and private homes, at the turn

of the 20th century. It also includes photos and biographical information on many of the town's "leading citizens" (all men, of course.)

Other Connecticut based libraries, archives, galleries and museums are working to create digital archives. Have you checked out Connecticut History Online (CHC?)

PLAINFIELD HISTORY ROOM

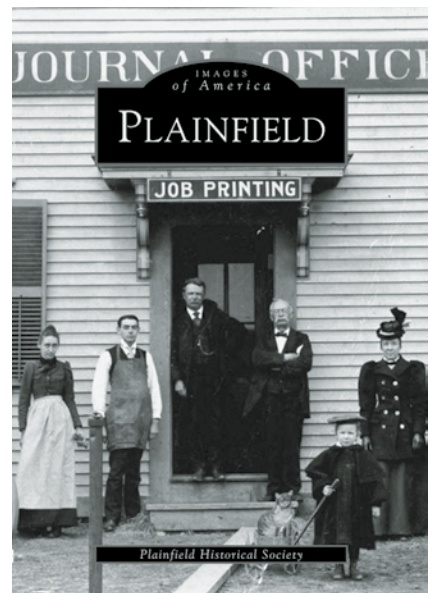
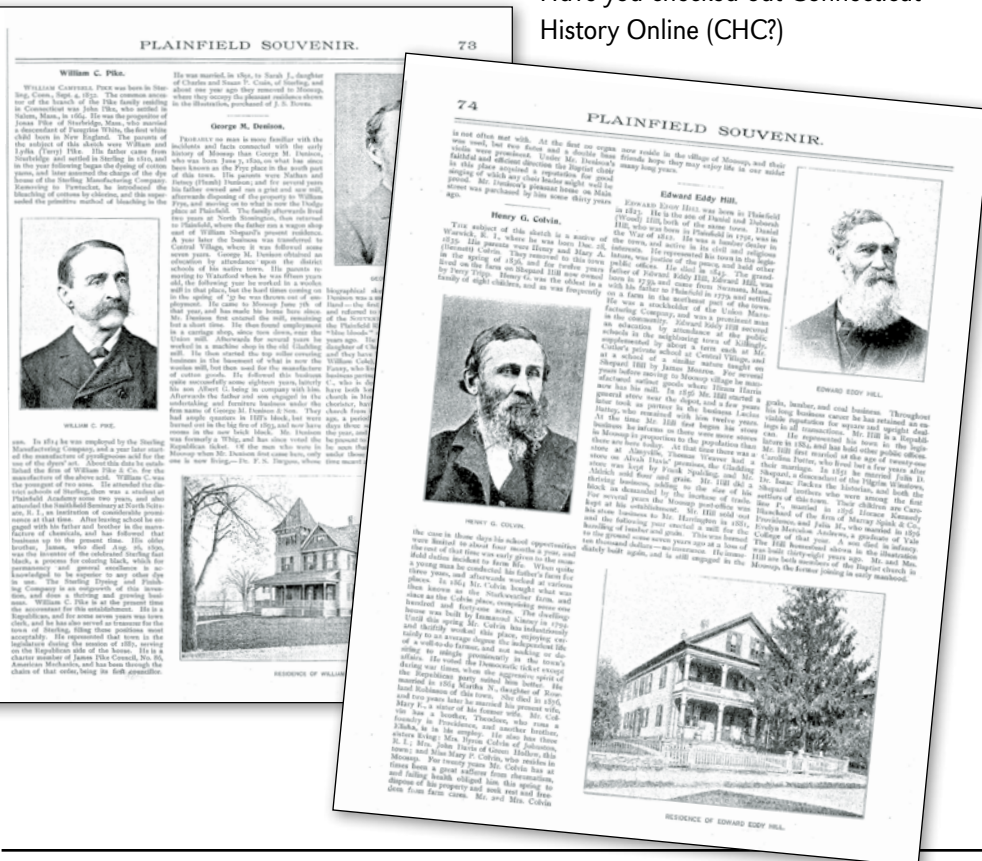
